

HC directs Punjab Kesari to NGT in hotel pollution case, extends status quo by a week

Upholds PPCB action: ‘board entitled to act under its emergency powers’

THE PUNJAB and Haryana High Court on Friday directed the The Hind Samachar Limited — owners of the *Punjab Kesari* newspaper — to approach the National Green Tribunal (NGT) in a case challenging punjab Pollution Control Board (PPCB) action against their luxury hotel, Park Plaza, in Jalandhar. The court, however, extended the status quo in respect of the hotel for one week to allow the petitioners to seek further legal remedies.

A Division Bench of Chief Justice Sheel Nagu and Justice Sanjiv Berry passed the directives while disposing of a writ petition filed by The Hind Samachar Limited and associated petitioners against emergency closure and electricity disconnection orders issued by the PPCB against the hotel in Jalandhar’s Civil Lines area.

Accepting preliminary objections raised by the Punjab government and the PPCB, the Bench held that the petition was not maintainable and that the petitioners had an effective statutory remedy before the NGT under the Water (Prevention and Control of Pollution) Act, 1974.

The petitioners had sought to quash the power disconnection order dated January 14, 2026, a notice issued a day earlier directing electricity cut-off, and a direction to restore government advertisements to Hind Samachar Limited as they stood prior to November 2, 2025. The court, however, confined its examination to the pollution-related action.

According to the board, an inspection conducted on January 13 found several violations at the 72-room hotel, which has a banquet hall, two restaurants and a swimming pool. The court noted the finding that the hotel’s sewage treatment plant “was not in operation during visit and untreated waste water was being bye-passed into municipal corporation sewer” with a “permanent provision of bye-pass”. The effluent treatment plant for laundry waste was also found to be non-functional, with untreated effluent being discharged into the municipal sewer.

The inspection report further recorded that the hotel

did not have authorisation under the Hazardous Waste Management Rules, had inadequate stack heights for diesel generator sets, lacked proper hazardous waste storage, had a non-operational mechanical composteur for wet waste, and maintained no records relating to water use, treatment plant operations or municipal approval for discharge of wastewater into the sewer. Effluent samples were collected and sent for laboratory testing.

Upholding the board’s action, the Bench said the pollution control board was entitled to act under its emergency powers. The court observed, “Where the Board is of the opinion that in view of the likelihood of a grave injury to the environment it is not expedient to provide an opportunity to file objections against the direction, it may for reasons to be recorded in writing, issue direction without providing such opportunity.”

Rejecting the argument that the petitioners were denied natural justice, the court said, “This argument is heard to be rejected on the ground that if opportunity was given in an emergent situation, then the very purpose of vesting the Board with emergent powers would stand defeated.” The Bench held that sufficient reasons had been recorded in the Board’s internal communication dated January 13, 2026, and that the law did not require prior communication of those reasons to the affected party.

The court also distinguished earlier judgments relied upon by the petitioners, including a 2019 Supreme Court ruling in the Sterlite Industries case, noting that the present matter “exclusively falls within the four corners of the Water Act”.

Before concluding, the Bench took note of an interim order passed by the Supreme Court on January 20, 2026, in a connected matter, which allowed uninterrupted functioning of the Punjab Kesari printing press while directing status quo in respect of other commercial establishments, including the hotel.

In view of this, the High Court extended the status quo for the hotel and other commercial establishments for one week, till January 30, 2026.

Punjab goes from rain deficit to surplus in 24 hrs, courtesy 13 mm precipitation

Overnight rain transforms seasonal rainfall scenario in Punjab, Haryana and Chandigarh, officials say

THURSDAY NIGHT’S widespread rainfall has moved Punjab into the rain surplus category with Haryana and Chandigarh recording a remarkable jump in cumulative rainfall, thus significantly altering the seasonal rainfall outlook across the regions.

The Meteorological Department has issued a red alert for thunderstorms, hail and lightning in several parts of Punjab, including Fatehgarh Sahib, Patiala, Rajpura and Bassi Pathana. The department has also issued an orange alert for Anandpur Sahib, Rupnagar and Samana.

For Chandigarh and several parts of Haryana, the Met department has placed a red alert. While Kaikla, Panchkula, Naraingarh, Barara, Shahbad, Nilotkheri, Indri, Kaithal, Karnal and surrounding regions are placed under an orange alert for Friday.

According to cumulative rainfall data, Punjab recorded 14.5 mm of rainfall including 13 mm in just the past less than 24 hours. The rainfall recorded is against a normal of 12.3 mm required in January month till date, registering a seasonal surplus of +18 per cent. This marks a dramatic turnaround from the previous day, when the state was facing a large rainfall deficiency.

The impact was most pronounced in several districts where heavy rainfall was reported. Gurdaspur recorded 43.3 mm against a normal of 20.7 mm (+109 per cent), Patankot received 33.3 mm, Jalandhar saw 32.6 mm (+83 per cent), Sangrur registered 21.5 mm (+168 per cent), Mansa received 14.5 mm against a normal of 5.1 mm (+184 per cent) and Barnala recorded 16.8 mm with a massive +150 per cent departure.

Other districts such as Amritsar (19.8 mm), Ludhiana (16.2 mm) and Tarn Taran (15.8 mm)

also reported substantial rainfall. However, a few districts including Moga (~100 per cent), Fazilka (~85 per cent), Ferozepur (~81 per cent) and Muktsar (~63 per cent) still remain highly deficient.

Haryana: Sharp improvement, though still deficient

In Haryana, the overnight rain caused a huge jump in cumulative rainfall, even though the state as a whole remains deficient. Cumulative rainfall now stands at 6.2 mm

against a normal of 9.3 mm, translating to a ~33 per cent departure, a significant improvement from the extremely deficient conditions prevailing earlier.

Bhiwani received 18 mm against a normal of 5.2 mm (+246 per cent), Fatehabad recorded 12 mm (+71 per cent), Hisar saw 7.4 mm (+28 per cent), Kaithal recorded 10.1 mm — slightly above normal and Charkhi Dadri registered 9.9 mm (+33 per cent).

At the same time, large parts of southern and eastern Haryana remain highly rainfall

deficient. Palwal, Rewari, Nuh continue at ~100 per cent, Fariabad at ~94 per cent, Gurgaon at ~88 per cent and Yamunanagar recorded at ~90 per cent.

The subdivision as a whole recorded 6.3 mm against a normal of 9.4 mm, narrowing the deficit to ~33 per cent.

Chandigarh records major rainfall jump

The Union Territory of Chandigarh also witnessed a sharp rise in seasonal rainfall due to the overnight showers. Cumulative rainfall has increased to 17.7 mm compared to a normal of 27.5 mm, reducing the deficit to ~36 per cent from a much steeper shortfall earlier.

The city recorded one of the highest single-day contributions, reflecting the intensity of the rain spell.

Meteorologists note that the event underscores how a single day of widespread rain can dramatically reshape seasonal statistics, especially during otherwise dry periods. While Punjab has emerged into the surplus category, Haryana and Chandigarh have seen substantial recovery, though more rainfall will be needed to erase deficits in several districts.

The rain has provided relief

to agriculture, but officials said rainfall distribution remains uneven, with some areas still facing acute shortages.

According to the advisory, moderate thunderstorms accompanied by lightning and hail, with wind speeds of 40–60 kmph, are very likely over parts of Patiala, Samana, Nabha, Rajpura, Dera Bassi, Fatehgarh Sahib, Amloh, Mohali, Khanna, Kharar, Khamanon and Chankar Sahib.

Moderate thunderstorms with lightning and gusty winds is expected over Sunam, Sangrur, Dhuri, Malerkotla, Payal, Ludhiana (East), Samrala, Rupnagar, Balachaur, Nawanshahr, Anandpur Sahib, Garhshankar, Nangal and Chandigarh.

Additionally, light thunderstorms with lightning and winds of 30–40 kmph may occur over parts of Amritsar, Gurdaspur, Pathankot, Hoshiarpur, Jalandhar, Kapurthala, Batala, Ajnala, Mukerian and surrounding areas.

The Met body has issued a thunderstorm warning valid till 6.25 pm on Friday, cautioning residents across several districts of Punjab and Chandigarh to stay updated, remain cautious and avoid open areas during lightning activity.

HP: Season’s first snow brings cheer — and discomfort

HIMACHAL PRADESH on Friday received its first snowfall this winter, ending a nearly three-month long dry spell, bringing much-needed relief to farmers and apple orchardists while disrupting normal life, particularly in the state capital Shimla and tourist destination of Manali.

Shimla received heavy snowfall, while moderate to heavy snowfall and rain was reported from higher reaches of Kullu, Lahaul-Spiti, Chamba, Kinnaur and parts of Sirmaur district. Farmers welcomed the precipitation, saying it would improve soil moisture and benefit horticultural crops.

According to the Meteorological Centre, snowfall activity higher reaches was likely to continue for the next couple of days.

Senior Scientist and Head Krishna Vigyan Kendra (KVK) at Rohru, Dr Usha Sharma, said the snowfall was much needed. “This year’s dry spell was longer

than that of 2024. Last year, there was snowfall in December. The snow will benefit all the crops,” she told the Indian Express.

Padma Shri awardee Hari-man Sharma of Hamirpur, popularly known as apple man of Himachal, said, “Wheat is the

main crop in the semi-hilly and lower hill districts including Hamirpur, Bilaspur, Una and Kangra. In the absence of rains since mid September, the wheat crop was at the verge of drying. Heavy rain was much needed in our region where farming is dependent on natural

resources. Moreover, the rain is also beneficial for mangoes and litchi. These two are the main fruits grown in our area”.

The weather office issued an alert for snowstorms in parts of eight districts — Chamba, Kangra, Kinnaur, Kullu, Lahaul-Spiti, Mandi, Shimla and Sir-



maur — warning of spells of moderate snowfall, isolated heavy snowfall and blizzard-like conditions. It also forecast moderate rain accompanied by thunderstorms, lightning and gusty winds reaching speeds of 40–50 kmph at isolated places in Una, Bilaspur and Hamirpur districts.

An orange alert for heavy snowfall has been issued for Kullu, Chamba and Lahaul-Spiti, while a yellow alert for rain and hailstorm remains in force for other districts.

As per the weather outlook, light to moderate rain and snowfall is likely at most places across the state on January 23 and 27, with isolated spells of heavy precipitation. On January 24 and 25, light rain or snowfall is expected at isolated places in higher hills. Light to moderate rain and snowfall may occur at a few places on January 26 and 28, while weather conditions are expected to remain mostly dry on January 29. A yellow alert for cold wave conditions has also been issued for January 24 and 25 at isolated locations.

The sudden change in weather is expected to bring a sharp drop in temperatures. The Meteorological Centre has predicted a fall of 3–5 degrees Celsius in minimum temperatures over the next 48 hours, followed by a rise of 2–5 degrees.

Over 2 lakh students apply for 20,000 seats in meritorious govt schools: Bains

Chandigarh: Punjab Education Minister Harjot Singh Bains on Friday said the state government’s ‘Sikhya Kranti’ (education revolution) initiatives are yielding positive results, citing a high volume of admission applications for Schools of Eminence and Residential Schools for meritorious students.

“Over two lakh students have registered for admissions to Classes 9 and 11, competing for nearly 20,000 available seats. The response shows growing confidence among parents and students in government school system,” Bains said in a statement.

According to the minister, Punjab at present has 118

Schools of Eminence and 10 Residential Schools for meritorious students. Admissions are currently being processed for the 2026–27 academic session.


For Class 9, there are 4,248 seats available in Schools of Eminence, calculated at 36 seats per school. Residential Schools for meritorious students offer 50 seats for Class 9 through one currently operational institution.

For Class 11, Schools of Eminence have 11,187 seats available for new applicants. While the total sanctioned intake is 15,104, 3,917 students currently in Class 10 at these institutions will be promoted internally. In addition, 4,600 seats are avail-

able in Residential Schools for Class 11 admissions.” So far, 93,300 students have registered for Class 9 admissions, out of which 74,855 applications have been submitted.

Similarly, for Class 11, 1,10,716 students have registered and 92,624 applications have been submitted. 36,537 students across both grades are yet to complete their final submissions, he said. Bains urged applicants to finish the process before January 25, 2026.

The entrance examination will be conducted on March 1, 2026. Details regarding admit cards and examination centres will be released through official channels later. PTI


